
January sees Renewal time again, with the Sub. remaining at £10 (\$15 overseas). Please renew – by cash, cheque or PayPal as soon as possible.

Thanks to **Michael Daniell's** eagle eye, another aspect of JMF's multi-talented career can be gazed upon.




JMF had gone up to Oxford in the Autumn of 1878. It is not known when he joined the Oxford University Chess Club, but he was a member by the Autumn of 1880. It is interesting to note that **Charles Lynam**, JMF's friend and fellow student at Hertford College (he matriculated in 1882), was not only a competitor but on the Club's Committee. Perhaps he persuaded JMF to join along with three others from the college.

We can dwell on the results of two thrillingly close chess matches, as reported in Jackson's *Oxford Journal* being played on Sunday May 22nd 1881 and Friday 4th November 1881. The 24-year-old JMF playing the 50-year-old H.M.I. Revd. H.A. Pickard on both occasions. Falkner triumphed in the first match recorded, but narrowly lost in the second. Perhaps the quarter-century experience gap finally made the difference. If only JMF could have managed another half point, the overall match would have been a tie.

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

NAMING THE OXFORD THREE

Sir Timothy Noble writes: "I have just read the article entitled *Naming the Oxford Three* by Michael Daniell in the latest JMF Journal. It prompted me to drop you a line to add a relevant fact for the author to consider.

Falconer Madan (usually known as Spencer, I believe) had a son called Geoffrey Spencer Madan, born on 6 February 1894, when his father was already 43. On 20 November 1919, Geoffrey Madan married Marjorie Noble, the daughter of Sir Saxton Noble and grand-daughter of Sir Andrew Noble. As JMF was introduced to the Noble family through his tutorship of my grandfather (Sir John Noble), it seems very likely that JMF introduced Spencer Madan and his son to the Noble family. The close connection almost certainly confirms him as one of the Oxford Three. By way of a postscript, the only child of Geoffrey Madan and Marjorie Noble was Nicola. She subsequently married Gordon Campbell, who was Secretary of State for Scotland in the Heath government of the 1970s."

MOONFLEET - TALLSHIP SAILING EXPERIENCE




old home in West Walks, Dorchester sent me an enticing leaflet about the classic gaff rigged* cutter, Moonfleet. The sailing introduction "is all based around a 'toe in the water' experience". Sailing packages include along the Jurassic coastline and to a "variety ofstunning places" including Portland Forts, Durdle Lulworth Door. Cove, Mupe and Worbarrow Bay and Chapman's Rightly, the leaflet ends with the proviso "all sails are weather dependent". Be wary of Chesil Beach!

* The gaff enables a fore and aft sail to be four sided, rather than triangular. A sail hoisted from a gaff is called a gaffrigged. [ed. I didn't know this either!].

ELSWICK AND BRAZIL

In Journal No. 14 (2013) I wrote an article detailing JMF's journey with Evelyn to Brazil in 1906. Orders for battleships followed, including one to be named Rio de Janeiro. However, between 1908 and 1913 Brazil's economy was in deep trouble. On 9th January 1914 the ship was sold to Turkey, who renamed it the Sultan Osman I. At the point of completion (and with the outbreak of the Great War) it was commandeered by the British Admiralty and again renamed – *HMS Agincourt*. The photo below was purchased on eBay last year, showing the ship in January 1914, with its original name.
